With community at our core, each year we engage approximately 400 students in our training programs and over the years we have helped thousands of young people develop into confident, healthy individuals who have gone on to pursue exciting careers.

STEP BY STEP

A glimpse into the incredible support of our government and corporate partners whose commitment to CircusWA is invaluable. We thank them for believing in us and our mission.

1980s

State Government gifted Fremantle's **Old Customs** House to the visual and performing arts sector.

2001-2014

Healthway begins ongoing funding for WA Circus School's community programs promoting 'Be Active'.

Lotterywest pledges ongoing funding to purchase new equipment and grow the delivery and quality of programs.

Department of Culture and the Arts (DCA) provides support via subsidised rent and one-off project grants for youth performances and projects for young artists.

2017

CircusWA moves to the Freo Big Top in Princess May Park with financial support from the City of Fremantle, DADAA, Lotterywest, **DCA** Strategic Initiatives grant, funding from the Federal Government's **Better Communities** Programme supported by Josh Wilson MP, and a successful community crowdfunding campaign.

1992-2001

Circus artists launch a training centre and with Government support establish a training and development program.

WA Circus School is incorporated in 2001.

2015-2016

New philanthropic engagement with The Fremantle Foundation.

The Merenda Family Fund generously funds four Hilton Aboriginal youth to attend circus training programs.

WA Circus School becomes CircusWA.

2018-2020

Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC, formerly DCA) continues supporting program development with a Strategic Initiatives business development grant, plus a grant funding the annual Youth Troupe program.

Lotterywest COVID-19 Relief Fund grant received in 2020 helps alleviate significant impacts from the pandemic.



2021

DLGSC Strategic Initiatives grant supports engagement with consultants Pracsys to develop Feasibility study and Case for Support for a State Centre for Circus and Physical Theatre.

Youth Troupe program supported with second year of program funds from **DLGSC**.

Biennial funding from **Healthway** supports outreach programming.

Creative Partnerships Australia awards Plus1 funding matching up to \$25,000 of philanthropic contributions. Matched funding goal realised.

BRINGING B'SPOKE TO THE STAGE

This year our annual fundraising campaign, Together We Can, seeks support for our Disabilities Program and the completion of B'Spoke, a thought-provoking and heartwarming circus and physical theatre show about a bespoke lighthouse that doesn't quite fit in with its more traditional counterparts. Delving into themes of individuality and acceptance, this captivating production is developed in collaboration with our Level Up Circus Academy and Disability Youth training program, 'Circus? You Can!'

B'Spoke gives children and teenagers living with disability opportunities to imagine more and dream beyond society's determination of their limitations. Through enchanting storytelling and inspiring circus arts, B'Spoke challenges stereotypes and promotes inclusivity by showcasing the creativity and capabilities of youth with diverse physical and intellectual abilities. This is what social circus is all about welcoming and celebrating difference.

We aim to raise \$30,000 to finalise B'Spoke, a project in development since 2022. Your contributions, no matter the size, will help B'Spoke reach its main stage debut at Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre in July, and make a significant impact on the lives of our young artists.

Performing alongside the CircusWA Youth Academy performers, these youth have an opportunity to share their unique abilities, personalities and perspectives on the world. Along the way they are challenging stereotypes and the preconceptions of others about who they are.

With a focus on joy and empowerment, B'Spoke is a captivating and inspiring celebration of diversity and inclusion.










TOGETHER WE CAN FOR B'SPOKE

The journey began in 2022 with the first small performance in August at the Fremantle Town Hall. Since then we have continued to grow and develop the skills of all our youth so they can come together as one creative ensemble.

In July 2024 we will be bringing B'Spoke to full production at the Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre.

The creative developments and training so far has been supported by Telethon7 in 2023 and the Stan Perron Foundation for training and rehearsals in 2024.


